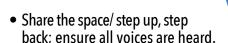

III. REPORTS

A. President's/Executive Director's Report – 30 mins., Davison/Mica

Davison provided information on the modality of future meetings and events for various groups and organizations within the system. Davison also shared an update on Executive Order pertaining to Bagley Keene. The Intersegmental Committee on Academic Senates (ICAS) AB 928 (Berman, 2021) subgroup is expected to meet a final time in order to define a general education (GE) pathway for CSU and UC transfers to be implemented by the fall of 2025. Subgroup recommendations will be considered by ICAS for approval at a future meeting, at

which point the proposed GE pathway will be vetted through all three systems, likely during 2022-2023 academic year. Davison shared information from the series of federal visits, the recent Baccalaureate Degree Conference, and California Competes 10-year event. Davison will be presenting at the next Board of Governors meetings on the 2022 Hayward Award winners, the Student-Centered Listening Tour, AB 928 (Berman, 2021) and AB 1111 (Berman, 2021).

Mica submitted a written report. Mica announced that the office team will be expanding with the addition of a new events assistant, Kayla Vue, an accounting clerk, and an additional administrative assistant. Mica also announced the winners of the 2022 Hayward Awards. Mica shared information from the Budget Committee and event logistics for upcoming events.

B. Foundation President's Report – 10 mins., Curry

The Foundation will be awarding scholarships to attend the 2022 Spring Plenary Session. Four scholarships, one in each area, will be awarded for in person attendance and ten scholarships, including 4 specifically for part-time faculty, will be awarded for online attendance. The Foundation recently awarded five scholarship winners to attend the African American Male Education Network and Development (A2MEND) Conference.

C. Liaison Oral Reports (please keep report to 5 mins., each)

Liaisons from the following organizations are invited to provide the Executive Committee with updates related to their organization: AAUP, ASCCC Caucuses: Small or Rural College Caucus, LGBTQIA+ Caucus, Latinx Caucus, Black Caucus, Asian Pacific Islander Caucus, Womxn's Caucus, CAAJE, CCA, CCCI, CCL, CFT, CIO, FACCC, the RP Group, and the Student Senate.

Dan Crump, Council of Chief Librarians (CCL) Liaison, provided an oral report. CCL will be sponsoring the Library Directors/Deans meeting that will be held virtually on March 17-18, 2022. Due to the virtual format, the meeting will be open to the entire library community. The Payan v Los Angeles Community College District course case will be discussed at the upcoming CCL Executive meeting.

Ty Simpson, ASCCC Black Caucus Chair, provided an oral report. The ASCCC Black Caucus is meeting once a month. Simpson announced that Karla Kirk was inducted onto the African American Historical and Cultural Museum Wall of honor at Fresno City College. Simpson shared information on the caucus' support at local events.

Frank Nigro, CCCCIO Liaison, provided a written report.

Henrietta Hurtado, ASCCC Latinx Caucus Co-Chair, provided an oral report. The caucus plans to meet during the upcoming 2022 Spring Plenary. The caucus is

currently working on updating its mission statement.

Rosaleen Ryan, RP Group Board Member, provided an oral report. Ryan announced that the RP Group is expanding its board of directors. Nominations for the board will open on April 6. The RP Conference 2022 will be held in person on April 12-14, 2022 at the Hyatt Regency Orange County in Garden Grove. The Strengthening Student Success Conference 2022 will also be held in person on October 5-7, 2022 in Garden Grove.

Gerardo Chavez, SSCCC President, and Paul Medina, SSCCC Regional Director, provided an oral report. Chavez shared information about the outcome of the Save Berkeley's Neighborhoods v. Regents of the University of California lawsuit and expressed concerns over the results' effect on transfer student enrollment. Medina provided updates on the SSCCC's efforts to engage nontraditional students and students who primarily speak Spanish. The SSCCC General Assembly will be held April 1-3, 2022. The SSCCC will host Advocacy Day on March 15.

Bethany Tasaka, ASCCC API Caucus Chair, provided an oral report. The caucus continues to hold monthly meetings. Tasaka reported on the conversations regarding the caucus' ability to support students affected by natural disasters in other countries. The caucus will plan to meet during the 2022 Spring Plenary.

D. Chancellor's Office Liaison Report – 30 mins., Davison, pg. 37

Aisha Lowe, Vice Chancellor for Educational Services and Support, provided an oral report. Lowe announced dates for the Chancellor's Office Curriculum Inventory (COCI) maintenance periods. Lowe shared updates from the California Community College Curriculum Committee (5C). The CCCCO is working on updating the Program and Course Approval Handbook (PCAH) as well as a joint memo with 5C on diversity and equity frameworks. Ten colleges have submitted applications for baccalaureate degree programs. Requests for applications for Rising Scholars are open until March 21, 2022.

IV. ACTION ITEMS

A. Legislative Report – 30 mins., May, pg. 39

May provided updates on the new joint analysis on the Governor's January budget. May shared information on the position letter from the Committee of Faculty Organizations (CoFO), potential spot bills, and details on the bill review process. May also reviewed pertinent bills with the committee.

No action by motion was taken on this item.

B. <u>Culturally Responsive Student Services</u>, <u>Student Support</u>, and <u>Curriculum – 10 mins.</u>, <u>Davison</u>, <u>pg. 57</u>

Curry shared 5C's efforts to finalize the DEI model principles and practices tool. The curriculum tool will be submitted for approval to the body via a resolution in

April 2022 and distributed at the Curriculum Regionals.

No action by motion was taken on this item.

C. Equity Driven Systems – 10 mins., Davison, pg. 59

Davison shared updates from the Equal Employment Opportunity and Diversity Advisory Committee (EEODAC). EEODAC is working on revising the hiring handbook to include recommendations from Association of Chief Human Resource Officers (ACHRO) partners. The Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Accessibility (DEIA) workgroup is coming to an end with its last meeting in March, although system-level work focused on DEIA will continue.

No action by motion was taken on this item.

i. Acronym for Anti-Racism and Accessibility Work - 15 mins., Bean/Mica, pg. 61

Bean provided background information on the various iterations of the DEI acronyms and the encompassing of diversity, equity, inclusion, antiracism, and accessibility within a new adoptable acronym. The committee deliberated the importance of incorporating "Anti-Racism" into the acronym and the established use of recognized acronyms.

MSF (Curry/Vélez) to adopt IDEA^2 to represent Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, Anti-Racism, and Accessibility.

MSC (Kirk/Stewart, Jr.) to adopt the acronym IDEAA to represent Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, Anti-Racism, and Accessibility.

D. <u>Transfer in the Higher Education system – 10 mins., Davison, pg.</u> <u>63</u>

May reported on updates on the Transfer Alignment Project Workgroup (TAPWG) and the group's efforts to reexamine UC transfer pathways to align with Transfer Model Curriculum (TMC). May and Mica are creating a document examining the possibility of having multiple TMC's within single disciplines to address disciplines that have divergent transfer pathways.

No action by motion was taken on this item.

E. <u>First Read of Curriculum Institute Agenda Outline - 20 mins.</u>, <u>Curry, pg. 65</u>

Curry presented the first draft of the Curriculum Institute program with the committee. Curry provided feedback received from the Curriculum Regionals regarding the modality of the institute. The committee provided suggestions including decreasing the amount of breakout sessions and adding prerecorded sessions.

No action by motion was taken on this item.

F. ASCCC Critical Race Theory Toolkit Outline - 20 mins., Bean, pg. 69

Bean presented the cultural humility toolkit developed by the Equity and Diversity Action Committee (EDAC). Members discussed resources and definitions to add to the toolkit. The committee encouraged cross collaboration for local senates to support the conversations on critical race theory.

MSC (Aschenbach/Parker) to approve the critical race theory toolkit draft with the incorporated suggestions.

G. Faculty Leadership Institute 2022 - 30 mins., Mica, pg. 73

Mica provided information on the collaboration with the SSCCC at the upcoming 2022 Faculty Leadership Institute and how the collaboration may affect the programming of the event.

The Executive Committee will review, provide feedback, and approve topics and structure for the Faculty Leadership Institute 2022. The committee discussed scheduling the collaborative sessions during one day of the institution. Representatives from the SSCCC voiced topics for sessions held during the collaborative portion of the event.

MSC (Parker/Arzola) to approve the proposed structure given a definition for collaboration with SSCCC and integration of IDEAA into topics.

H. 2022 Career and Noncredit Education Institute - 15 mins., Vélez/Arzola, pg. 75

The Executive Committee reviewed and provided feedback on the first draft program and theme for the 2022 Career and Noncredit Education Institute.

MSC (Parker/Kirk) of approval of *Student Centered Change: A Transformative Experience* as the theme for the 2022 Career and Noncredit Education Institute.

Members deliberated on the modality of the event and the feasibility of future hybrid institutes and suggested using a synchronous and asynchronous format.

MSC (Stewart, Jr./Howerton) to approve the first draft of the 2022 Career and Noncredit Education Institute.

I. 2022 Spring Plenary Final Draft Approval - 60 mins., Davison/Mica, pg. 87

The Executive Committee reviewed and provided feedback on the final draft of the 2022 Spring Session program. Mica provided deadlines for the final program to the committee. Mica announced David Morse as the Elections Chair and Davena Burns-Peters as the Official Observer.

MSC (May/Bean) to approve the final draft of the 2022 Spring Plenary program.

Mica presented the technological logistics of using two different voting platforms for elections and resolutions. The committee expressed concerns over the timing of the separate voting periods and the use of multiple voting platforms. Members suggested practicing voting with faculty during the Area Meetings.

J. 2022 Spring Executive Committee Resolutions Review - 60 mins., Gillis, pg. 89

Gillis reviewed the resolutions listed in the resolution packet with the committee. Edits were made to the draft resolutions to better articulate the issues as well as provide clarity on the intent of the resolution. The acronym of DEI was updated to IDEAA in line with the motion passed from agenda item IV. C. i. Acronym for Anti-Racism and Accessibility Work.

MSC (Aschenbach/Kirk) to approve of the resolutions packet with continued efforts to revise the resolution, *A Faculty Responsibility for Equitable, Accessible Learning Environments*.

MSC (Curry/Vélez) to include the revised resolution, *A Faculty Responsibility* for Equitable, *Accessible Learning Environments*, in the 2022 Spring Plenary resolutions packet.

MSC (Bean/Curry) to add a resolution in the 2022 Spring Plenary resolution packet for the addition of "Anti-Racism" into the ASCCC Mission and Vision.

V. DISCUSSION

Roberson reported on the survey responses from the Part-Time Faculty Institute.

Roberson shared feedback on the event from the Part-Time Faculty Committee. Members discussed the feasibility of scheduling the institute during the summer season and partnering with FACCC in the future. The committee suggested changing the format of the institute to a regional approach to address specific concerns within the Part-Time Faculty community. Roberson will share Executive Committee feedback with Part-Time Faculty committee members and will bring a proposal for consideration at a future meeting.

D. <u>Discussion on ASCCC Inclusivity and Values - 30 mins., Mica/Roberson, pg.</u> 109

Mica provided background information on the need to prepare for situations that may arise during ASCCC events. The committee discussed non-negotiables and the need for presenter training to create effective safe spaces for attendees. Members deliberated on the criteria, policies, and procedures needed to discourage disruptive comments and behavior. Caucus leaders also provided support in creating safe spaces within their communities. The committee voiced the importance of adding "Anti-Racism" to ASCCC's Mission and Vision statements as a resolution in the 2022 Spring Plenary Resolution Packet.

Legislative Report – Detailed Bill Information for 2022

Bills regarding Academic and Professional Matters

Assembly Bills (AB)

(2022 bills begin with AB 1594)

AB 102 (Holden) – Pupil attendance at community colleges: College and Career Access Pathways partnerships: county offices of education.

[Two-year bill] This bill would specify that "high school," for purposes of a CCAP partnership, includes a community school or juvenile court school. The bill would authorize county offices of education to enter into CCAP partnerships with the governing boards of community college districts in accordance with these provisions. The bill would require the above-described certification requirement for certain remedial courses to instead apply to certain pretransfer level courses, as provided. The bill would extend the provisions authorizing CCAP partnerships indefinitely. The bill would also make nonsubstantive conforming changes.

Official ASCCC Position/Resolutions: The ASCCC has supported CCAP in the past.

Status: In Senate and ordered to Committee on Rules 1/25/22

Notes: Uses "pretransfer level" instead of "remedial" to describe course type,

<u>AB 103 (Holden)</u> College and Career Access Pathways partnerships: best practices: communication and marketing strategy.

[Two year bill] This bill would require the State Department of Education and the office of the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges, in consultation with experts in the field of CCAP partnerships, to identify best practices for CCAP partnerships and appropriate financial incentives for school districts and community college districts to participate in CCAP partnerships, and to distribute the best practices to school districts and community college districts on or before September 1, 2023. The bill would also require, on or before September 1, 2023, the department and the office of the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges, in consultation with experts in the field of CCAP partnerships and other key stakeholders, to develop a statewide pupil and parent centered communication and marketing strategy that includes specified outreach and information, in order to increase the visibility of the CCAP partnerships for all secondary pupils in California.

Official ASCCC Position/Resolutions: The ASCCC has supported CCAP in the past.

Status: Died in committee

Notes:

AB 295 (Jones-Sawyer) – Public postsecondary education: pilot program for free cost of attendance: working group.

[Two-year bill] This bill would establish a working group consisting of representatives from the State Department of Education, the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges, the Trustees of the California State University, the Regents of the University of California, and faculty, staff, and students from the California Community Colleges, the California State University, and the University of California to consider the creation of a pilot program, as specified, that would cover the cost of attending postsecondary education in the state by replacing the system of charging students tuition, fees, and additional expenses for enrollment at a public postsecondary institution. The bill would require the working group to submit a report to the Legislature on the pilot program.

Official ASCCC Position/Resolutions: The ASCCC has long supported reducing the cost of college. Rostrum Article: Cal Grant Modernization and the True Cost of College, April 2021; Resolution S16 6.01 – Support Legislation to Increase Cal Grant Awards; Resolution S11 6.01 – Community College Fees

Status: In Senate and ordered to Committee on Rules 1/27/22

Notes:

AB 949 (Mullin) Community colleges: Pathways to Biotechnology Programs.

[Two year bill] This bill would make available, upon appropriation in the annual Budget Act, the sum of \$10,000,000 to the Chancellor's Office of the California Community Colleges for the purpose of expanding student pathways to biotechnology programs, as specified. The bill would authorize the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges, or its authorized designees, to contract with the Foundation for California Community Colleges for the purpose of providing administrative support for the expansion of pathways to biotechnology programs. The bill would require the Chancellor's Office of the California Community Colleges, on or before July 1, 2025, to submit a report to the appropriate budget and policy committees of the Legislature regarding the outcomes resulting from the use of these funds, as specified.

Official ASCCC Position/Resolutions:

Status: Died in committee

Notes:

AB 1097 (Santiago) Community colleges: California College Promise: fee waiver eligibility.

This bill would specify that first time students include formerly and currently incarcerated students, and would expand eligibility for a fee waiver to first time students who are enrolled part time and complete and submit the required application. The bill would also make conforming changes.

Official ASCCC Position/Resolutions: The ASCCC has long supported reducing the cost of college. Rostrum Article: Cal Grant Modernization and the True Cost of College, April 2021; Resolution S16 6.01—Support Legislation to Increase Cal Grant Awards; Resolution S11 6.01—Community College Fees

Status: Died in committee

AB 1187 (Irwin) – Community colleges: tutoring.

[Two-year bill] This bill would provide that supervised tutoring for all credit and noncredit courses, as authorized pursuant to regulations adopted by the board of governors by July 31, 2023, is eligible for state apportionment funding.

Official ASCCC Position/Resolutions: Support as of 2/5/22. The ASCCC remained neutral on AB 1935 (Irwin, 2018), which died in committee. The ASCCC took a position of support (as of 4/3/18) on SB 1009 (Wilk, 2018), which died in appropriations.

Status: In Senate and ordered to Committee on Rules 1/25/22

Notes: This bill reintroduces AB 1935 (Irwin, 2018).

AB 1232 (McCarty) – Community colleges: nonresident tuition fees: English as a second language courses.

[Two-year bill] This bill would add an exception to the requirement for payment of nonresident tuition for specified nonresident students enrolled in a credit English as a second language course. To the extent that this provision would impose new duties on community college districts, it would constitute a state-mandated local program.

These regulations, in years in which the board of governors determines that the annual Budget Act does not contain adequate funding to warrant full implementation of this full-time faculty obligation, authorize a community college district to instead choose to maintain, at a minimum, the full-time faculty percentage attained by the community college district in the prior fall term.

This bill would require the board of governors to adopt regulations that require the fall of 2023 full-time faculty obligation for each community college district to be set to the actual full-time faculty number reported for the fall of 2022 and annually adjusted pursuant to these regulations.

<u>AB 1606 (Irwin Ramos)</u> – Public postsecondary education: veterans: waiver of mandatory systemwide tuition and fees.

As amended 3/16/22...

This bill would additionally include the spouse or unmarried surviving spouse of any veteran of the United States military who has a service connected disability, has been killed in service, or has died of a service-connected disability. instead require that the annual income of the child not exceed the area median income, as defined. The bill would also make nonsubstantive changes to provisions relating to this waiver of mandatory systemwide tuition and fees. To the extent these provisions would add additional duties on community college districts, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

This bill would instead include the spouse of a veteran with a disability rating of 70 percent or greater in the definition of "dependent of a veteran." The bill would repeal that the provision prohibiting a dependent of a veteran from receiving those educational benefits, as specified.

AB 1705 (Irwin) – Seymour-Campbell Student Success Act of 2012: matriculation: assessment

This bill would make findings and declarations of the Legislature's intent to continue to increase California community college student placement and enrollment in transfer-level English and

mathematics. The bill would require that high school transcript data be used as the primary means for determining placement in transfer-level English and transfer-level mathematics courses, and would limit the use of multiple measures by colleges in the placement and enrollment of students so they do not restrict a student's ability to demonstrate preparedness for transfer-level coursework if a single measure would satisfy the requirement. The bill would require that a community college district or community college not recommend or require students to enroll in pretransfer level English or mathematics coursework, except under specified circumstances.

This bill would require a community college district or community college, by July 1, 2023, to place and enroll all new and continuing United States high school graduate students and those who have completed a GED into transfer-level English and mathematics, with specified exceptions for mathematics placement. The bill would prohibit a community college district or community college from using specified factors as justification for placing a student in a pretransfer level course. The bill would require the Chancellor's Office of the California Community Colleges to create a Transfer Level Gateway Completion Dashboard by July 2023. The bill would require the dashboard to be updated annually and to contain specified data. The bill would require, beginning September 1, 2023, and annually thereafter, the chancellor's office to provide a report to the Legislature with data from the dashboard, as specified.

AB 1746 (Medina) – Student financial aid: Cal Grant Reform Act

This bill would enact the Cal Grant Reform Act, which would revise and recast the provisions establishing and governing the existing Cal Grant Program into a new Cal Grant Program. The bill would specify that the Cal Grant Reform Act would only become operative upon the appropriation by the Legislature, in the annual Budget Act or another statute, of sufficient funds to fully implement its provisions. The bill would authorize the commission to adopt emergency regulations to implement the Cal Grant Reform Act. The new Cal Grant Program would also include a Cal Grant 2 Program and a Cal Grant 4 Program, with eligibility requirements as specified.

This bill would authorize each campus of the California State University, the California Community Colleges, and the University of California to establish a campus mental health hotline for students to access mental health services remotely. The bill would require each campus of the California State University and the California Community Colleges, and request each campus of the University of California, with a campus mental health hotline to have printed on either side of student identification cards the telephone number of the campus mental health hotline for a student identification card issued to a student on or after January 1, 2023, as specified.

This bill would require the State Department of Education and the office of the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges, in consultation with experts in the field of CCAP partnerships, to identify best practices for CCAP partnerships and appropriate financial incentives for school districts and community college districts to participate in CCAP partnerships, and to distribute the best practices to school districts and community college districts on or before September 1, 2024. The bill would also require, on or before September 1, 2024, the department and the office of the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges, in consultation with experts in the field of CCAP partnerships and other key stakeholders, to develop a statewide pupil- and parent-centered communication and marketing strategy that includes specified outreach and information, in order to increase the visibility of the CCAP partnerships for all secondary pupils in California.

schedule. The bill would define, for purposes of this requirement, "course materials" to include digital or physical textbooks, devices such as calculators and remote attendance platforms, and software subscriptions.

This bill would require, on or before January 1, 2024, the governing board of each community college district to make available to the public, as specified, the schedule of courses that must be completed to obtain, and the number of academic years, months, semesters, or terms that it takes to obtain, each associate of arts degree and certificate offered by a community college maintained by the district. The bill would require, on or before January 1, 2024, the governing board of each community college district to offer each course required for the completion of each associate of arts degree and each certificate offered by a college and, to the extent that this requirement is not practicable, would require the governing board to (1) hold a public hearing and make findings on why its compliance with the requirement is not practicable, (2) develop, approve, and present to the chancellor's office, for the chancellor's office's review and approval, a plan to comply with the requirement within the earliest timeframe possible, up to a maximum of 6 years, as provided, and (3) make its findings and plan available to the public, as specified. By imposing new duties on community college districts, this bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

Resolved by the Senate of the State of California, That the Senate recognizes that academic freedom, as determined defined by the American Association of University Professors, entitles teachers to "full freedom in research and in the publication of the results, subject to the adequate performance of their other academic duties; but research for pecuniary return should be based upon an understanding with the authorities of the institution"; and be it further

Assembly Bills (AB)

AB 1602 (McCarty) – Student, faculty, and staff housing: California Student Housing Revolving Loan Fund Act of 2022.

This bill would establish the California Student Housing Revolving Loan Fund Act of 2022 to provide zero-interest loans to qualifying applicants of the University of California, the California State University, and the California Community Colleges for the purpose of constructing affordable student housing and faculty and staff housing, as specified. The bill would establish the California Student Housing Revolving Fund as a continuously appropriated fund in the State Treasury, thereby making an appropriation. The bill would state the intent of the Legislature to appropriate \$5,000,000,000 for purposes of the housing loans. The bill would require the California School Finance Authority and the California Educational Facilities Authority to submit a report, by March 15, 2024, to the Department of Finance and the budget committees of the Assembly and Senate containing information on the act, as provided. The bill would apply certain provisions of the California Educational Facilities Authority Act to the University of California and the California State University for purposes of housing projects, as defined. This bill would declare that it is to take effect immediately as an urgency statute.

AB 1719 (Ward) – Housing: Teacher Housing Act of 2016: faculty and community college district employees.

This bill would expand the authorized scope of a program established under the Teacher Housing Act of 2016 to include housing for faculty and community college district employees and would make various conforming changes in this regard. The bill would also specify that a school district or community college district may allow foster youth or former foster youth to occupy housing created through the program.

AB 1736 (Choi) – Community Colleges: student government.

Existing law authorizes the governing board of a community college to authorize the students of a college to organize a student body association and requires a student who is elected to serve as an officer in the student government to be enrolled in the community college at the time of election and throughout their term with a minimum of 5 semester units or its equivalent.

This bill would additionally allow a student to be elected to serve as an officer in the student government if they are enrolled with a minimum of 25 clock hours per semester or the equivalent quarter clock hours, or are a disabled student, as defined.

AB 1752 (Santiago) – Community colleges: part-time employees. (Pay parity)

This bill would require persons who are employed to teach adult or community college classes part time, as provided, to receive compensation in at least an amount that bears the same ratio to the amount provided to full-time employees as the time actually served by those part-time employees bears to the time actually served by full-time employees with comparable duties. The bill would impose this pay requirement upon the expiration or renewal of existing collective bargaining agreements, as provided.

This bill would also require community college districts, as a condition of receiving funds allocated for the Student Success and Support Program in the annual Budget Act, to commence the negotiation of terms of compensation consistent with the proportional pay requirement for part-time employees, as well as terms governing reemployment preferences and evaluation processes, no later than the expiration of any negotiated agreement in effect on January 1, 2023, and for any community college district that does not have a collective bargaining agreement in effect as of January 1, 2023, upon the effective date of the bill.

This bill would require the California State University, and request the University of California, to require each campus in their respective systems to grant students up to five years to reenroll in their baccalaureate degree program after withdrawing, as specified.

This bill would instead require community colleges, as a condition of receiving funding allocated for the Student Equity and Achievement Program, to negotiate in good faith with the exclusive representatives for part-time, temporary faculty on the terms of the reemployment preference for part-time, temporary faculty assignments and the regular evaluation process for part-time, temporary faculty. The bill would instead require that negotiation on reemployment preference for part-time, temporary faculty assignments be based on the minimum standards not exceeding 80% to 85% of a full-time equivalent load, and would prohibit the community college district from restricting the terms of the negotiated agreement to less than that range, unless explicitly agreed upon by an individual part-time, temporary faculty member and the district. The bill would require the community college district to commence the negotiation of these terms no later than the expiration of any negotiated agreement in effect on January 1, 2023, and for any community college district that does not have a collective bargaining agreement in effect as of January 1, 2023, upon the effective date of the bill. The bill would make conforming changes and repeal obsolete provisions.

This bill would change the maximum time a part-time, temporary employee may teach, without becoming a contract employee, to 85% of the hours per week of a full-time employee having comparable duties.

AB 1913 (Bryan) – Los Angeles Community College District: California Center for Climate Change Education.

This bill would establish the California Center for Climate Change Education, as part of the Los Angeles Community College District, to be located at West Los Angeles College, for purposes of establish partnerships and developing educational resources to assist students and faculty of the state's public elementary, secondary, and postsecondary systems by providing fact-based education about climate change and its direct relation to equity and environmental justice issues. The bill would appropriate \$5,000,000 from the General Fund for the development and initial operations of the center. To the extent the bill would impose additional obligations on the Los Angeles Community College District, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program. This bill would make legislative findings and declarations as to the necessity of a special statute for the Los Angeles Community College District.

Upon the enactment of an appropriation for this purpose, the bill would require the Chancellor of the California State University to distribute funding to each California State University campus to offset the costs of waiving tuition and mandatory systemwide fees to transfer students pursuant to this bill. The bill would make implementation of its provisions contingent upon the enactment of an appropriation for its purposes.

<u>AB 2401 (McCarty)</u> – Teacher preparation programs: planning grants and implementation or expansion grants

This bill would revise and recast that program to instead require the commission to award planning grants of up to \$250,000 each to regionally accredited institutions of higher education to develop plans for the creation of integrated programs of professional preparation that lead to more credentialed teachers either in shortage fields or that reflect a local educational agency's community diversity, as provided. The bill would require the commission to award implementation or expansion grants of up to \$500,000 each for regionally accredited institutions of higher education to develop new, or expand existing, programs of professional preparation or to establish a new partnership with a California community college, as provided. The bill would require a regionally accredited institution of higher education to provide program and outcome data for at least 5 years after receiving the implementation or expansion grant. The bill would make these grant programs contingent upon appropriation of funds in the annual Budget Act or another statute.

This bill would authorize a local agency to use teleconferencing without complying with those specified teleconferencing requirements if at least a quorum of the members of the legislative body participates in person from a singular location clearly identified on the agenda that is open to the public and situated within the local agency's jurisdiction. The bill would impose prescribed requirements for this exception relating to notice, agendas, the means and manner of access, and procedures for disruptions. The bill would require the legislative body to implement a procedure for receiving and swiftly resolving requests for reasonable accommodation for individuals with disabilities, consistent with federal law.

The bill would also require a postsecondary institution, and would request each campus of the University of California, to update its internet website to contain specified information regarding these topics on or before January 1, 2024. By imposing new duties on community college districts, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

SB 885 (Laird) – Community colleges: Cooperating Agencies Foster Youth Educational Support Program. Current and former foster youth support: NextUp.

This bill would expand that rename the Cooperating Agencies Foster Youth Educational Support Program as NextUp, and would expandauthorization for the program by removing the 20 community college district limit, limit. The bill would instead authorize the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges to enter into agreements with community college districts to provide, and allocate to selected community colleges within a community college district, funds for services in support of postsecondary education for foster youth, and would make conforming changes. The bill would require a community college district that wishes to participate in the program to submit a letter of interest to participate to the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges, as specified.

This bill would authorize students enrolled in fewer than 9 units to be accepted into the program if enrollment is part of an academic plan designed to move the students toward subsequent enrollment in at least 9 units.

This bill would instead authorize the chancellor to designate up to 1% of funds allocated to the program for program administration, program development, and program accountability.

SB 886 (Wiener) – California Environmental Quality Act: exemption: public universities: housing projects.

This bill would make a nonsubstantive change to the provision relating to the public review period for those draft environmental impact reports. exempt from CEQA a student housing project, as defined, or a faculty and staff housing project, as defined, carried out by a public university, as defined, on real property owned by the public university if the project meets certain requirements and the project is not located, in whole or in part, on certain sites, including a site that is within a special flood hazard area subject to inundation by a 1% annual chance flood or within a regulatory floodway as determined by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, as provided. The bill, with respect to a site that is within a special flood hazard area subject to inundation by a 1% annual chance flood or within a regulatory floodway, would prohibit a local government from denying an application on the basis that a public university did not comply with any additional permit requirement, standard, or action adopted by that local government applicable to the site if the public university is able to satisfy all applicable federal qualifying criteria in order to demonstrate that the site meets these criteria and is otherwise eligible to be exempt from CEQA pursuant to the above requirements. By imposing additional duties on local governments, this bill would impose a state-mandated local program. The bill would provide that a student housing project or a faculty and staff housing project is not exempt from CEQA if, among other things, the project would require the demolition of specified housing or a historic structure that is listed on a national, state, or local historic register.

<u>SB 1141 (Limón)</u> – Public postsecondary education: exemption from payment of nonresident tuition.

This bill would reduce, for purposes of eligibility for this exemption from paying nonresident tuition, the total years of full-time attendance in certain California schools, the years of full-time high school coursework in California, and the total years of attendance in California elementary schools and California secondary schools required from 3 or more years to 2 or more years, and would make a conforming change.

<u>SB 1160 (Durazo)</u> – Public postsecondary education: exemption from payment of nonresident tuition.

This bill would delete the exception from this provision made for a person the term "immigrant," as defined, from "before the exception" The bill would therefore make the person eligible for the exemption from nonresident tuition made by this provision if the nonimmigrant "alien meets" its requirements.

BACKGROUND:

During the fall 2021 plenary session, delegates of the Academic Senate for California Community Colleges voted to approve resolution <u>01.05</u>, which states:

Resolved, The Academic Senate for California Community Colleges should make remote attendance an option at all ASCCC-organized events, including plenary sessions

Even prior to the passage of this resolution, the ASCCC was testing and finding different ways to make all of our events as accessible as possible to a broad range of audience. In June 2021, as soon as it was safe to do so, the ASCCC transitioned all of its Executive Committee meetings into a fully-hybrid format. The Fall Plenary Session was also held in a fully virtual environment, allowing attendees to decide whether they attend the event in-person or via Pathable, the online platform used for the last two years to hold our virtual events. The upcoming spring plenary session is once again being held fully-hybrid, as well as the remainder of the institutes for 2021-22: Career and Noncredit Education, Faculty Leadership, and Curriculum.

The cost of providing virtual access to our large events is astronomical. The figures noted below show the increasing cost of the technology necessary to continue to provide the virtual access for events that are also in-person:

(this includes Pathable, internet, and AV needs)

- Fall Plenary \$62K
- Spring \$84K (estimated)
- Career and Noncredit \$69K (estimated)

- Faculty Leadership \$90K (estimated)
- Curriculum \$100K (estimated)

Prior to the pandemic, costs for AV tended to be around \$10-15K, as the ASCCC required minimal technology support from the hotel and did not provide internet access (or was negotiated in the hotel contract) for attendees.

Moving forward, the ASCCC should discuss and determine how to best provide professional learning opportunities for our faculty, while keeping in mind the cost of providing the events. The ASCCC has a history of keeping fees nominal at events and it would be important to continue to do so to make our events as accessible as possible. Some considerations the committee might make would be to:

- Transition events like the Academic Academy and Career and Noncredit Institute to fully virtual.
- Determine which hybrid events really need the fully-hybrid capabilities and which do not and what an alternative option for a hybrid event could look like
- Other considerations?

This charge followed the Recording Policy Sub-Committee developed formation on 12/04/21 to make recommendations on what could be recorded, and an Executive Committee first read. Academic Senate for California Community Colleges Meetings or Event Audio/Video Recording Policy Proposed April, 2022

Section 1. Overview

This policy is designed to protect ASCCC's intellectual property and members' privacy, as well as establish a retention policy for any audio/video recorded meetings or events. The intent of this policy is to strike a balance between the legitimate uses of audio/video recordings, and concerns including compliance with the law, privacy, and protection of intellectual property.

In an effort to comply with California law, promote the freedom to share ideas and to respect the privacy of members, the secret recording of meetings or events is prohibited.

Section 2. Educational or Professional Learning [Development] Events

- 2.1 ASCCC's educational or professional learning [development] events may be recorded by ASCCC.
- 2.2 All other *audio/video* recordings made by any other party, regardless of manner or format, are prohibited at ASCCC educational or professional learning [development] events or meetings. One exception to the policy allows people to audio or video record an ASCCC event with the knowledge or consent if they have prior written authorization in advance and in writing by from ASCCC.

Section 3. Site Visit Academic Senate Events

3.1 The purpose of this policy is to ensure that the ASCCC complies with applicable policies when hosting site visits with Local Academic Senates.

- 3.2 Site visits are an opportunity for the ASCCC to build and maintain relationships with Local Academic senates. During an event, ASCCC representatives and staff members visit CCC campuses/Districts, meet with relevant stakeholders, and engage in dialogue.
 - 3.2.1 ASCCC site visits to Local Academic Senate's may not be recorded unless an exception is granted in advance and in writing by ASCCC. An exception may be granted in the sole discretion of ASCCC upon recommendation of the Executive Director and approval by the Executive Committee or Board of Directors.

Section 4. Other Events

4.1 Other events that are organized or sponsored wholly or in part by ASCCC or include a material presence by ASCCC agents or employees may be recorded only if approved in advance and in writing by ASCCC. Approval may be granted upon recommendation of the Executive Director and approval by the Executive Committee or Board of Directors.

Section 5. Disability Accommodations

5.1 The ASCCC is committed to the full accessibility of our educational/professional learning [development] speaking events, programs and activities to individuals with disabilities. ASCCC will make a good faith effort to provide reasonable requested accommodations for qualified visitors, and event attendees with a disability unless the such accommodation requested would cause an undue hardship as defined by the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

- 5.2 To ensure regulatory compliance and oversight of all matters related to access and reasonable accommodation for individuals with disabilities, local Academic Senate ("Senate") will take steps to ensure that all lawful requests for disability accommodations are fully addressed in a reasonable and lawful manner.
- 5.3 In order for ASCCC to meet its obligation to provide reasonable accommodations, Senate agrees that any requested disability accommodations shall be communicated to ASCCC once the Senate becomes aware of such requirements, or no less than three days in advance of the meeting or event. Further, the Senate acknowledges that for online events, professional learning [development] adjustments shall be provided exclusively for attendees with Deaf, Hard of Hearing, or similarly impaired persons, closed captioning services and for no other purpose whatsoever, and it shall will be deleted within 48 hours of completion of the event.

Attendees to events may request reasonable disability accommodations. ASCCC will make a reasonable attempt to provide accommodations. Requests for disability accommodation that cannot be addressed through reasonable efforts are subject to denial.

Section 6. Closed Captioning for Online Events

6.1 Closed captioning shall only be used exclusively as a reasonable accommodation for Deaf, Hard of Hearing, or similarly impaired persons, and for no other purpose whatsoever. Unauthorized use of closed captioning by attendees can result in legal and disciplinary action, including among other things, removal from current and future events.

All closed captioning transcripts of events shall, without exception, <u>shall</u> be deleted within 48 hours of completion of the event.

Academic Senate for California Community Colleges Event Audio/Video Recording Policy APPENDIX I DEFINITIONS

Academic Senate: As defined in Title 5 "An Academic Senate for California Community Colleges has been established through ratification by local academic senates or faculty councils so that the community college faculty of California may have a formal and effective procedure for participating in the formation of state policies on academic and professional matters" (Title 5, Section 53206, California Code of Regulations).

Faculty Member: Any employee of a community college district who is employed in an academic position that is not designated as supervisory or management.

Intellectual Property encompasses numerous forms of intangible personal property. For purposes of this Policy, intellectual property includes but is not limited to copyrights and copyrightable materials, patented and patentable inventions, tangible research property, trademarks, service marks and trade secrets.

Professional Learning [Development] in the educational context can be defined as a wide variety of specialized training, formal education, or advanced professional learning intended to help administrators, teachers, and other educators improve their professional knowledge, competence, skill, and effectiveness. California education code section 87153 ARTICLE 5.
Community College Faculty and Staff Development Fund [87150 - 87154] authorized uses of funds allocated under this article shall include all of the following:

BACKGROUND:

The Budget and Finance Committee is responsible for developing and recommending the annual ASCCC operating budget to the Executive Committee for approval. This occurs in two stages. The Budget and Finance Committee meets to prepare a tentative budget to bring to the Executive Committee for approval at a final meeting of the fiscal year, typically late May/early June but can be brought as early as April. Approval of the tentative budget allows the ASCCC to operate during the summer months. The Budget and Finance Committee then meets again in the summer to develop the final annual budget proposal to bring to the Executive Committee for approval at the August meeting.

The Budget and Finance Committee will review the tentative 2022-23 budget prior to the May Executive Committee meeting. Funding recommendations will be developed based on current trends such as protecting reassigned time for Executive Committee members, maintaining staff salaries and benefits and expanding ASCCC staff, expanding program and committee budgets to reflect additional costs such as hybrid event modalities, and anticipating any recurrence of the COVID-19 pandemic through 2023. The tentative budget will include projected numbers for the grants C-ID and OERI.

The Executive Committee will have an initial discussion of the tentative plan for the budget and provide recommendations to the Budget Committee. The budget will be reviewed and updated for presentation of the budget at the May Executive Committee meeting.

- AB 1705 (Irwin) Described as "clean up language" for AB 705 (Irwin, 2017). The committee discussed some possible concerns with the current language. There is hope to work with the bill's author. Currently, there is no recommendation for a position for this bill. The SSCCC Liaison reported the work of the student senate advocating for the bill have a request to meet with the bill's author by SSCCC. The FACCC Liaison shared some additional concerns and some trends in practice by various districts. The chair will update the committee as additional information arises.
- AB 1746 (Medina) Reintroduces AB 1456 (Medina, 2021) which was vetoed by the governor due to budget implications. This bill addresses those concerns. Currently we do not have a position, but we may consider taking one. This version has more funding for community college students. ACTION: The committee agreed to recommend a position of support in the form of a resolution (including "as of date" to be determined with the Executive Committee) for consideration by the delegates at the spring plenary session and also submit the draft resolution to the ASCCC Executive Committee for consideration. May will draft the resolution. The SSCCC Liaison shared that the SSCCC supports this bill. The chair will work with the ASCCC Resolution Committee for submission.
- SR 45 **ACTION**: In collaboration with the ASCCC Educational Policies Committee, the LAC agreed to recommend a position of support in the form of a resolution for consideration by the delegates at the spring plenary session and also submit the draft resolution to the ASCCC Executive Committee for consideration. Need for support to promote and sustain the coordination of these proven successful efforts. Committee member M. Figueroa may start to draft an

article and then tie in how the LAC can advocate. This should be a data dive and analyze while weaving in the qualitative experience.

The Academic Senate for California Community Colleges (ASCCC) embraces diversity and strives to deliberately create a safe and inclusive environment valuing social justice and honoring diverse voices (Inclusivity Statement). In 2020, standing in solidarity with our Black colleagues, ASCCC published a special summer edition of the Rostrum featuring the voices of Black community college faculty. In honor of the California Community Colleges systemwide Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Awareness month (April) and as a follow up to the 2020 summer Rostrum edition, the ASCCC Equity and Diversity Action Committee (EDAC) invites you to submit articles written in the theme of Answering the Call to Action: Racial Equity, Reckoning, and Academic Accountability Since the Murder of George Floyd.

Please consider submitting an article for publication to rostrum@asccc.org by Monday, April 18, 2022. There is work to advocate for some amendment language being requested for AB 1705. Concept language was shared and the committee provide feedback/recommendations. Although it may be difficult to have such an amendment added, the committee supported the idea of putting forward and advocating for a similar type of amendment as student agency is important. The goal is to not prohibit a student from enrolling in pretransfer-level course if that course meets the educational goals or needs determined by the student. The chair also shared a "spot bill": AB 1964 (Fong). Recommended amendments to send to the legislature are being considered by the LACCD at the March 16 Board of Trustees meeting. The amendment proposals include to include language for the CSU to accept CCC approved Ethnic Studies courses for the lower division graduation requirement.

- 1. Ginni welcomed everyone. Brief introductions followed.
- 2. Agenda approved (Collins, Parker MSC)

 - a. Krystinne volunteered to update the document based on suggestions
 - b. Suggestions:
 - Integrate info on timeline document into action plan
 - Include link to tracking document shared by Miguel
- 4. Proposal Tracking document on website for discipline progress in Transfer Alignment Project Miguel drafted a tracking document. The document will be included on both the C-ID website and the TAP website.
- 5. Updates:
 - a. Timeline (Miguel) review and update timeline
 Miguel said that the FDRG for Geography requested they be added to Phase II.
 Jim Chalfant and Hilary Baxter shared that there is currently no UCTP for
 Geography, so an aligned UC/CSU pathway is not possible. Krystinne clarified
 that the Geography FDRG request falls outside this project because there is no
 UCTP. Eric Wada asked all to consider what a UCTP would look like for
 Geography. Ginni suggested this inquiry could be an item to include in Phase III
 if there are enough transfers in that major at UC.
 - b. Phase II: Disciplines reports/progress: Biology, English, Political Science (Miguel, Eric, Ginni)
 Biology and English would like to discuss whether revisions to UCTP are possible. Political Science can move forward but needs CCC and CSU members

on FDRG (only 1 of each currently; Rob Collins reported that more CSU members had volunteered and are being trained). Eric reported that a survey for Political Science has gone out; feedback will be reviewed by a (hopefully) complete FDRG.

- 6. Phase III: Disciplines where a single TMC pathway is not feasible (Ginni, Eric, Miguel)
 - a. Explore possibility of re-examining UCTP bring proposal ICAS
 Ginni will draft a proposal to be reviewed by TAP members in preparation for March 8 ICAS meeting.
 - b. Proposal to ICW for possibility of changing rule, "one TMC per discipline" need proposal drafted for April 26, 2022 meeting

 As has been discussed at past meetings, disciplines at UC and CSU are not necessarily consistent with disciplines at CCCs, and there are multiple career paths embedded within each discipline that may require different preparation. Ginni, Eric, and Krystinne as ICW members will get a draft started to be completed by the end of March.

It was also suggested that we ask ICAS to revisit its letter of two years ago calling for additional funding to support C-ID and faculty collaboration across all three segments. As a side note, Jim Chalfant shared that UC will likely be able to better support a joint request if it's written in such a way that UC is supportive of the CSU & CCC C-ID efforts rather than being directly involved with the budget request since UC academic senates don't make legislative or funding requests.

- c. Remaining disciplines for consideration Eric Wada shared with Communication that they might want to take a look at UCTP as they do their 5-year review. It'll likely go to Phase III because it doesn't currently align. Ginni suggested Engineering could also be included in Phase III as the potential for a TMC/ADT now exists with AB928 allowing additional units (60-unit restriction may be investigated for the potential of 66 lower division units)

Overview and Purview of the Affordable Student Housing Taskforce

The Board of Governors has prioritized the development of a holistic, student-centered, affordability and basic needs infrastructure. This priority includes a focus and strategy around student housing which increases the stock of affordable units to support low-income students and facilitates their access to higher education.

The Chancellor's Office will convene an Affordable Student Housing Taskforce on behalf and in alignment with the goals of the Board of Governors. Members will be appointed by the President of the Board. The Taskforce will:

- develop a comprehensive student housing framework which addresses both shortand long-term needs, policies, and the operational infrastructure necessary to expand affordable student housing at California Community Colleges
- engage and learn from districts participating in the Higher Education Student
 Housing Grant, including reviewing feasibility studies and technical assistance
 needs, to understand elements that are essential to a robust California Community
 Colleges student housing program
- present recommendations to the Board of Governors which lay out strategies for maximizing the Higher Education Student Housing Grant, that identify necessary statewide standards or regulations, maximize flexibility for local planning and decision-making, and create the conditions to support the re-envisioning of a student-centered support ecosystem
- present to the Board of Governors preliminary findings by May 16, 2022
- present a final report and recommendations by November 2022.

Overview

The 2021-22 State Budget included a one-time \$2 billion investment in student housing. Specifically, Senate Bill 169 (SB 169) appropriates \$500 million in FY 21-22 for the Higher Education Student Housing Grant Program. The program's purpose is to offer affordable, low-cost housing options for public postsecondary students in California. Of the \$2 billion investments, 50% of the resources over three years, or \$1 billion, will be dedicated to increasing the stock of affordable student housing at California's community colleges. This presents a historic opportunity to address one component of the affordability issues community college students face and intentional alignment to college' basic needs framework of supports.

Applications for the first of three rounds of funding were due on October 31, 2021 to the Department of Finance. The Department of Finance will provide recommendations to the California Joint Legislative Budget Committee in March of 2022. The memo provide a summary of all the California Community College applicants for the first round of grants.

CCC District Applications for the Higher Education Student Housing Grant Program

Summary

In total, there were 95 applications that were collected and reviewed. Of the applications submitted, there were four districts that have partnerships with other organizations or colleges. These districts and their partners are the following:

- 1. Butte CCD and CSU Chico Planning Grant
- 2. Imperial CCD and San Diego State Construction Grant
- 3. Los Rios CCD, Cosumnes River College and Eden Housing/Sacramento Housing and Redevelopment Agency Construction Grant
- 4. Merced CCD and UC Merced Construction Grant

There were district applications that were submitted separately as a construction and a planning grant but so ingrained with each other that they were listed together as a single application. These applications are the following:

- 1. 106A and 106B Antelope Valley CCD
- 2. 97A and 97B Ohlone CCD (Newark Campus)

3. 97C and 97D – Ohlone CCD (Fremont Campus)

San Mateo CCD sent in one application for both construction and planning grant funds. In total, there are 24 requests for construction funds totaling \$1.56 billion and 73 requests for planning grants that total \$181.8 million for a grand total of \$1.7 billion. The State funding requests total \$1.66 billion and local contribution is \$81.8 million.

Overall, 22 projects are for new construction and two for purchase of a commercial building for renovation to become student housing. Most of the construction projects will have the necessities for a small community.

The planning grants that districts have applied for vary. Some districts are moving forward with a feasibility study only and trying to see if there is a need for student housing on their campus while other districts have requested for more funds to go from initial study to planning the student housing project.

Legislative Update on Housing and Affordable Student Housing Legislation

Digest: Members of the Taskforce will receive an update on legislative proposals related to student housing. This informational update is intended to provide an overview of key policy discussions affecting housing, and student housing specifically.

SB 234 (Wiener D) Transition Aged Youth Housing Program.

SUMMARY: Would establish the Transition Aged Youth Housing Program for the purpose of creating housing for transition aged youth under 26 years of age, who have been removed from their homes, are experiencing homelessness unaccompanied by a parent or legal guardian, or are under the jurisdiction of a court, and would require the council to develop, implement, and administer the program.

SB 886 (Wiener) California Environmental Quality Act: exemption: public universities: housing projects.

SUMMARY: This bill would exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act a student housing project or a faculty and staff housing project carried out by a public university or college if the project meets certain requirements.

<u>AB 75(O'Donnell)</u> Education finance: school facilities: Kindergarten-Community Colleges Public Education Facilities Bond Act of 2022.

SUMMARY: This bond bill, if approved by voters during an unspecified statewide election in 2022, would provide \$12 billion to construct and modernize K-14 education facilities. This bill includes an urgency statute.

Position: Support

AB 1602 (McCarty) Student, faculty, and staff housing: California Student Housing Revolving Loan Fund Act of 2022.

SUMMARY: This bill would establish the California Student Housing Revolving Loan Fund Act of 2022 to provide zero-interest loans to qualifying applicants of the UC, CSU, and the CCC for the purpose of constructing affordable student, faculty, and staff housing. This bill also states the intent of the Legislature to appropriate \$5 billion for the purposes of housing loans.

AB 1764 (Medina) Public postsecondary education: student housing: survey. SUMMARY: This bill exempts community college housing projects from the Field Act, which normally requires the Division of the State Architect (DSA) to supervise the design and construction of any school building. Specifically, the bill would:

 Require CSU, UC, and the California Community Colleges (CCC) to collect data on student housing insecurity, paying special attention to underserved groups. Each higher education segment will submit the first data report to the Legislature and the

Affordable Student Housing Taskforce

- Legislative Analyst's Office by October 15, 2023. This bill would require each segment to submit a report on this compiled data again by October, 2025, and October 2027.
- Exempt community college student housing projects from Division of the State
 Architect (DSA) review. The intent of this provision is to streamline planning and
 expedite construction of these projects. This builds upon AB 306 (O'Donnell), which
 was signed into law in 2021 and exempted K-12 and community college district
 workforce housing projects from DSA review.

ACA 1 (Aguiar-Curry) Local government financing: affordable housing and public infrastructure: voter approval.

SUMMARY: The California Constitution prohibits the ad valorem tax rate on real property from exceeding 1% of the full cash value of the property, subject to certain exceptions. This measure would create an additional exception to the 1% limit that would authorize a city, county, city and county, or special district to levy an ad valorem tax to service bonded indebtedness incurred to fund the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of public infrastructure, affordable housing, or permanent supportive housing, or the acquisition or lease of real property for those purposes, if the proposition proposing that tax is approved by 55% of the voters of the city, county, or city and county, as applicable, and the proposition includes specified accountability requirements.

Update on the Department of Finance and Legislature SB 169 Higher Education Student Housing Grants Process

Digest: SB 169 appropriated \$500 million one-time General Fund in fiscal year 2021-22 for the Higher Education Student Housing Grant Program, which supports one-time grants to either construct student housing or acquire and renovate commercial properties to provide affordable, low-cost housing options for students attending the University of California, California State University, and the California Community Colleges. SB 169 states intent to provide 50%, or \$1 billion, of available program funds to community college projects.

Per the SB 169 Higher Education Student Housing Grant Program, on March 1, the Department of Finance (DOF) released the list of applications it is recommending for funding in FY 21-22. <u>DOF Letter and List of Recommended Projects</u>

DOF recommends funding construction of student housing projects at five community college district (CCD) worth \$214.5 million. The Department also recommend to the Joint Legislative Budget Committee (JLBC) providing \$135 million for projects at UC, and \$120 million for projects at CSU. Further, DOF proposes \$18.1 million for planning grants for CCD projects, essentially providing some planning grant dollars to all districts that applied though the amounts do not necessarily reflect their request.

The Legislature will now evaluate DOF's recommendations and determine which projects should be funded as part of the budget process. The Governor has proposed \$750 million for the second installment of this program in FY 22-23.

Members of the Chancellor's Office staff will provide a presentation of the Department of Finance recommendation and themes within projects proposed for funding in 2021-22.

Discussion of Affordability and Need Measures

Digest: Member of the taskforce will begin to explore data that can support and inform affordable student housing efforts, including technical assistance for planning and data for accountability.

The taskforce will learn about the affordability measures used in the two most recent affordable student housing investments: 1) the 2021-22 Higher Education Student Housing Grant Program, and 2) the 2019-20 Rapid Rehousing Pilots.

Affordable Student Housing Taskforce

The 2021-22 Higher Education Student Housing Grant Program contained specific language for qualifying unit rents for low-income students. More specifically, "rents in applicable units for low-income students shall be calculated at 30 percent of 50 percent of the area median income (AMI) for a single-room occupancy unit type." This is lifted from affordable housing policy, with area median income set on an annual basis by the Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) and at a county level. On an annual basis, the HCD provides a document on this information.

In addition, the taskforce will hear about the measures used in the College Homeless and Housing Insecure Pilot Program. The program was funded through a \$9 million allocation included in the 2019-20 budget to support rapid rehousing services to California community college students.
